




#### About the author

Australian writer Marcus Andrew Hislop Clarke, known as Marcus Clarke, was born in Kensington, London. His mother died when he was just a small child and he was raised by his father, a lawyer.

Marcus Clarke moved to Victoria, Australia, where he had an uncle in the provincial town of Ararat and landed in Melbourne in June 1863. In 1869 Clarke married the actress Marian Dunn and shortly afterwards they started to raise a family of six children. He died of pleurisy at the age of thirty-five. He was a courageous



journalist writing about Melbourne's underworld and was the author of the classic *For the Term of his Natural Life*. Which has been in print since it was first published in 1874.










#### **Activities**

   BLM provided.
- Our hero Rufus Dawes is transported out to Australia in barbaric conditions. (Complete the cut-away prison ship/hulk illustration. BLM provided)
- Create a fact file on the Transportation system. (BLM provided)
- Create character profiles for the major characters in the story. The characters change a lot over time so you will need to add to the profiles during the book.
- Complete the quotes activity (BLM provided)
- Complete the glossary activity (BLM provided)
- Write down a plan for the mutiny aboard the *Malabar*.
- Complete a map of south-eastern Australia showing important locations in the story (Including Macquarie Harbour, Port Arthur, Norfolk Island, Sydney) BLM provided. How does the east coast of Tasmania differ from the west coast?
- Convicts received lashes from the cat-of-nine-tails for often very minor infringements. (Refer the punishment inflicted on Kirkland) Illustrate and explain the process and purpose of a form of punishment used against convicts.
- Dawes was thought to have died on Grummet Island.
   Complete a death certificate for him. (BLM provided)
- Create a soldier and convict paper doll (BLM provided)
- Write a front-page story in the *Hobart Town Gazette* about the trial. **(BLM provided)**
- Write one of Dawe's letters to the Governor.

- Create a 'report card' for a prisoner (BLM provided) or a prison record (BLM provided)
- Create a fact file on either Port Arthur or Norfolk Island.
- Write a diary entry by Mr North about life on Norfolk Island. (BLM provided)
- Explain the 'love triangle' between Frere, North and Dawes with Sylvia in the middle. (BLM provided)
- In the conclusion of the story, *The Lady Franklin* sinks and Dawes and Sylvia die. Re-write the last chapter to give it a happy ending.
- Create a poster project on either the Tasmanian tiger or Tasmanian devil.
- Complete the crossword and wordsearch provided.



**Transport System** 

Investigate the 'Convict Transportation System'

Transportation had been employed as a punishment for both major and petty crimes since the 17th century. About 60,000 convicts were transported to the British colonies in North America in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries under the terms of the Transportation Act 1717. Following the American Revolution over 165,000 convicts were sent out to Australia from 1788 to the 1860s.

During the colonisation of Van Diemen's Land some convicts were sent into the bush with guns and dogs to hunt for food for the struggling colony. Some decided to leave behind the

hardships of penal life and remain at large. Others simply wandered off (especially from Sarah Island when they went to work on the mainland.) Many escapees died in the bush while others survived by stealing and trading and became known as bushrangers.



#### **Bushrangers**

#### **Reading Comprehension**

There were two main periods of bush ranging in Australia. The first from the 1790s to the 1830s and the second from the 1850s to the 1870s.

The bushrangers in this early period were usually convicts who had escaped into the bush. They were called 'bolters'. They lived in the bush, plundering settlers' huts for food and supplies and robbing travellers. This was how they kept alive.

John Caesar, one of the early Tasmanian bushrangers set a pattern for defiance towards authority. Governor Hunter demanded that Caesar surrender, but he said he would never surrender or be taken alive. Many bushranging gangs plagued Van Diemen's Land (as Tasmania was called) these gangs were led by bushrangers such as John Whitehead, Michael Howe and Matthew Brady. One notorious bushrangers Piece was even guilty of cannibalism.

The best known of these early bushrangers on the mainland was Jack Donahue who had been transported to Australia in 1824, when he was 18. Donahue first escaped into the bush in 1827. Later in the same year he was recaptured after bailing up (robbing) several bullock carts on the Richmond Road. Donahue was sentenced to death but escaped again. It wasn't until 1830 that Donahue's career as a bushrangers came to an end. He was shot by police while resisting arrest near Campbelltown in NSW.

Because of the increasing problem of bushrangers Governor Darling passed a special Bushranging Act in 1830. This meant arrests could be made without a warrant and those who could not prove they were 'free men' could be taken into custody.

Large finds of gold in the 1850s led to a new phase of bushranging when many failed diggers found it easier to steal gold from the diggers than to prospect for it themselves. By 1860 there was another change. Bushrangers were usually Australian born and belonged to the poor settler or rural worker class. They hated rich squatters and the law which seemed (and probably did) favour the wealthy. Their theft of cattle, horses and money from the wealthier people could be a way to get even with them (and also revenge grievances from the old country)

These bushrangers were often helped by other poor settlers. (Ned Kelly had a large network of supporters) They gave bushrangers shelter and supplies and

often acted as lookouts. Frank Gardiner, Captain Thunderbolt, the Clarke brothers and Ben Hall were well armed and had better horses and more accurate local knowledge than the troopers chasing them.

The bushranger's life was usually a short one. Frank Gardiner and Martin Cash were probably the only ones to live to old age.

Ned Kelly is Australia's best-known bushranger and was regarded as the last of the bushrangers. After killing three policemen and robbing two banks Ned was captured and his gang killed. He was hanged in old Melbourne Gaol on 11th November 1880 after being captured at the siege of Glenrowan.

#### **Facts about Bushrangers**

#### Bolter

Australia's first bushranger John 'Black' Caesar who came out with the first fleet became a bushranger because of his appetite. Caesar used to eat two days' supply of rations in one day. He 'bolted' to the bush and began raiding settler houses.

#### Stop the song

Governor Darling issued a proclamation banning the singing of the song 'Bold Jack Donahue' in public houses.

#### Captain who?

Many bushrangers were known by an alias. Captain Moonlight's name was Andrew Scott. Captain Thunderbolt was Fred Ward and Captain Melville was Frank McCallum

#### Not all white men

One bushranger, Sam Poo was Chinese, Jimmy Governor was aboriginal and Captain Thunderbolt's partner, aboriginal woman Mary Ann Bugg had many extraordinary exploits long after Thunderbolt's death.

#### Reformed

Martin Cash led a desperate gang of bushrangers in Van Diemen's Land in 1842. He was captured and imprisoned in the brutal Norfolk Island penal settlement. He was a model prisoner and later became caretaker of Hobart's Botanical Gardens.

#### A fortune


During his time as a bushranger, Captain Thunderbolt stole about \$1 000 000 in 2002 money that was never recovered.





# **Ned Kelly Timeline**

- was born sometime between December 1854 and June 1855, in Beveridge, Victoria. His precise birthdate is not known.
- was the eldest son of eight children to John 'Red' Kelly and Ellen Quinn.
- as a child saved another boy from drowning the boy's family awarded him a green silk sash in recognition of his bravery.
- was twice convicted and sentenced to prison in the 1870s, first for assault and then for receiving a stolen horse.
- attacked Constable Fitzpatrick while he was attempting to arrest Dan Kelly in April 1878. Fitzpatrick was wounded by a pistol shot and warrants for the arrest of Ned and Dan Kelly were issued.
- with his gang ambushed and killed three police officers at Stringybark Creek, Victoria in October 1878.
- staged bank robberies at Euroa in 1878 and at Jerilderie in 1879.
- composed a document written down by gang member
   Joe Byrne known as the 'Jerilderie Letter' in which Kelly tried to justify his crimes.
- used suits of armour to protect himself and his gang members during a final battle with police at Glenrowan in June 1878.
- was tried, convicted, and then executed in Melbourne on 11 November 1880.

Link the sentence by telling the reader how many arguments and your point of view. (eg. *Here are three arguments why Ned Kelly is a hero.*)


Present your three arguments (minimum of three). Don't forget time and sequence words such as firstly, secondly, finally.
